Allergies	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dog to be non-moulting- reducing the risk of allergic reaction • Parents to be informed of dog on site and should let us know if their child is/ may be allergic • Teachers to ensure that children with allergy does not come into contact with dog • Dog kept clean and groomed • Areas where dog is kept to be cleaned particularly carefully well • Dog's bed and blanket to be kept clean and well maintained • First aid kit to be kept in areas where dog will be in contact with children (offices, Thrive room) 	>			
Bites, cuts and scratches	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cockapoos are bred to be sociable dogs and can often be used as therapy dogs- they are known to be good with children. Staff/ children known to have allergies and phobias to have restricted contact • No unsupervised contact with pupils • Dog to be kept under control • Pupils and staff to be made aware of the procedures of meeting and handling the dog • Adult supervising to ensure dog not over petted. If dog appear anxious or over stimulated it should be removed to peaceful surroundings 	>

Noise and barking	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Cockapoos are bred to be sociable dogs and are often used as therapy dogs as they are known to be good with children The dog is being introduced to the children from an early age so will be acclimatised to a noisy environment and therefore reduce the chance of it barking 			>			
Fire drill and evacuation of dog	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Dog to hear fire alarm on several occasions before a fire drill takes place in order to acclimatise to the noise 			>
